



## When I Heard the Learn'd Astronomer

By Walt Whitman 1867

Walt Whitman is a famous American poet who is often called the father of the "free verse" style of poetry. He wrote during the time of urbanization in America. "When I Heard the Learn'd Astronomer" was published in 1867, describing one character's experience listening to a "learn'd" man. As you read the poem below, take notes on the way Whitman describes the astronomer's lecture.

  - When I sitting heard the astronomer where he lectured with much applause in the lecture-room,

  - Look'd up in perfect silence at the stars.
