What to include in a quote analysis?

- Identify the quote

- Identify the author and the title

 - *Once you have identified the author by first and last name, you may refer to him later with LAST NAME ONLY (Ex. When Douglass refer to)*
- Context
 - *Explain what is happening in the story when the quote is being used*
 - *ASSUME YOUR READER DOES NOT KNOW THE PROMPT.*
- Significance/So What?
