4. What important thing happened in 1776?
5. What is the impact of Lincoln referring to such a famous date (1776)?
6. What impact does starting the 2^{nd} paragraph with "now" have on its meaning?
After questions above have been discussed and answered, <u>rewrite</u> your translation of Lincoln's first paragraph based on what you have learned.
Explain how your translation changed:
7. After re-reading the second paragraph, explain the sections of the following sentence:
"We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place"
"for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live"

After reading the third paragraph silently and then aloud, translate the third paragraph into your own words (1-2 sentences).

9. What does Lincoln describe as the impact of those who fought at Gettysburg?

11. How does Lincoln use the idea of "unfinished work" to assign responsibility to his listeners?
12. What four specific ideas does Lincoln ask his listeners to commit themselves to at the end of the speech?
