	Examples from The Devil & Tom Walker	Your Gothic/Horror Story
Eerie setting with a wicked history	+ Dark, gloomy, melancholy swamp + Known location of former Indian fort and the burying of pirate treasure	
Detailed descriptions of characters	+ Greedy (miserly) + Tom and his wife argued (and she hit him) + Tom's wife is "fierce of temper, loud of tongue, and strong of arm".	
Villain described in great detail	+ Red eyes + Swathed in red + Carries an ax + Begrimed with soot	
Dark symbolism	+ The carrion crows represent death + The trees with names carved in them represent individual people.	
Evil bargain	+ Tom's wife attempts to offer her household valuables for the pirate's treasure.	
Sinister quest of one of the characters	+ Toms goes to make a deal with the devil. + Tom's wife attempts to do the same.	
Gruesome find	+ The heart and liver of Tom's wife hanging in a tree	
Lesson learned	+ Don't be greedy + If something seems too good to be true, it probably is	
Builds suspense	+ Taking an "ill-chosen" route through the swamp	
Foreshadowing	+ The carrion crows foreshadow the death of Tom's wife + The devil is "begrimed with soot as if accustomed to working with fire"
