POETRY ANNOTATION HOW TO AND WHY

WHAT DOES ANNOTATE MEAN?

It is a fancy way of saying "take notes".

A well-annotated poem should be highlighted and have notes written everywhere.

WHY DO I NEED TO ANNOTATE A POEM?

To help really, REALLY understand the deeper meaning of a poem Every time you read a poem, you can see details you didn't see the first time. Every word and punctuation mark are chosen deliberately by the poet.

Step 1: Read the title of the poem

What questions do you have based on the title?
What might be the meaning of the title?

Step 2: Read the poem twice. Aloud if you can. (Yes, I said twice)

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Step 3: Jot down any questions you may have about the poem – no matter how trivial or silly they may seem.

Step 4: Define all unknown or partially-known words. Also, look up words that are familiar but perhaps used in a different context.

<u>Step 5</u>: Now, read the poem again with the words defined.
Does it make more sense now?
This is the <u>literal meaning</u> of the poem.

Step 6: Look up any people or places (or other Capitalized words) referred to in the poem.

Step 7: Look for tone words; Is there a pattern? Does the pattern change?

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Step 8: Look for interesting phrases
Is there a pattern in the wording?
Do they relate to any of the notes you have "scribbled" in the margins?

Step 9: Look for literary devices (such as personification, symbolism, metaphors, etc.) Think about why the poet used these. What effect does it have on the poem?

Step 10: Read the poem again. Then read all your notes and "scribble scrabble".
NOW, does it make sense?
If not, start over at Step 1

Step 11: Think about the meaning of the poem. What is the poet saying about "life in general"? What lesson can be learned from the poem?
 This is the THEME.
